President's Message: Rick von Geldern







About the American Cancer Society Road To Recovery Program

The American Cancer Society Road To Recovery program is a curbside-to-curbside transportation service the provides free rides to cancer patients to and from their cancer-related treatments. Trained volunteer drivers donate their time and the use of their personal vehicles to help patients get to their treatments.

The program is offered to people with cancer who have no means of transportation and/or are unable to drive themselves. Access to transportation is a major factor in cancer treatment, and this American Cancer Society service offers assistance to people who might otherwise not be able to follow their treatment plan as prescribed by their health care team.

Cancer patients cite transportation to and from medical treatments as a critical need, second only to direct financial assistance. Many people need daily or weekly treatments, often over the course of several months. Increasingly, these treatments are offered on an out-patient basis, which means that the person must have a way to get to the appointment. Family and friends may help, but they may not have the time or financial means to assume the total burden of frequent trips to treatment centers.

A successful transportation assistance program can be a tremendous asset to the community, The Road To Recovery program is the very essence of the Society's mission- people helping people get healthy.
